# **COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROJECTS** – Shelly Keyser

Meals on Wheels Placemats - Community Program 2015

Does your fabric stash need a spring cleaning to make room for some bright new fabrics or do you have a scrap basket that is overflowing and continuing to grow? If so, please take the opportunity to grab some great fabrics or leftover blocks from your stash and make a few placemats and mug rugs for our community program - Meals on Wheels.

We will be supporting the North Toronto Meals on Wheels as our community outreach program for 2015. The program delivers meals to individuals who are 55+, facing challenges such as chronic illness, poor nutrition and isolation. Last year the program delivered over 36,000 meals, to a client base of about 200 clients. While funded by the provincial government and clients themselves (clients do purchase their meals), the program wouldn't be possible without the efforts of about 100 volunteers who deliver meals and spend time with each of the clients.

We feel Meals on Wheels is a valuable program in helping seniors remain self-sufficient and in their own homes, so we would like to target one placemat per client (200) and one mug rug per volunteer (100), to be delivered in December. There are no specific size requirements - but placemats are often about 13 x 18; mug rugs can vary anywhere from about 4 inches square and up - some are big enough to hold a jumbo cookie with the coffee cup!

Guild members have already made close to 20 placemats and other members have told me they have

more in progress, so we're well on our way to a generous contribution of placemats and mug rugs in December 2015. Additionally, if you have fabric or batting pieces you wish to donate to this program, I can redistribute or kit for other members to help us get to our target.



#### 5. Quilts Inc. International Quilt Festival, Chicago -Maureen Merrill and Joy Takahashi

*From Maureen Merrill* - I had the opportunity to attend this show again this year. It is put on by the same people who do the show in Houston (and Portland) but it is on a smaller scale. For a few years they held the show to Cincinnati but now it is back in the Windy City. While I found everything I was looking for (specialty threads and a good selection of batiks for a double wedding ring quilt I am making for my niece's wedding gift) what I did not see was anything new that made me go "WOW". Apparently there were 70 less vendors this year than there were last year and it showed. However, the display of quilts at these shows is still impressive. Unfortunately you cannot take pictures of all of the quilts so attached are pictures of some of the ones that caught my imagination. This is Chicago however so I enjoyed some of many temptations Chicago has to offer: symphony, theatre and two food walking tours and spent only my last day at the quilt show. I would highly recommend a visit to the city and, notwithstanding its flaws, this show. One thing I did find at the Superior Threads booth that I was not looking for was the person in the picture below.



*From Joy Takahashi* - Sometimes a change in scenery can bring inspiration to the creativity machine! And so, after 4 days at the Chicago Quilt Festival (including a play day at the Art Institute) I've come back re-energized and anxious to finish up and apply some new techniques and projects! In addition to viewing the quilts (all 700 of them) and having a look/see at the 200 vendors, I took a few half day workshops: African Folklore Embroidery (using hand dyed cotton floss from South Africa) and Fabric Scrap Bowls (using 1 inch scrap strips wound around a clothesline) both taught by Catherine Redford (Illinois) and my favorite, with Cindy Walters (Hawaii) where we learned how to use fabric "snippets" to create an impressionistic painting. She told us to think of the snippets as "dabs of paint" and the technique of making the snippets really did feel like "painting"! On the show floor, I took a course on fabric bead making (because I love jewellry and fabric!) and watched a demo on making fabric greeting cards (sort of like crazy quilting on peltex). In hindsight, it appears the theme behind my course selection was all about creatively using up scraps! It was a whirlwind experience that was exhausting but in a most refreshing kind of way!
